PARENTAL SUPPORT

: The Governors are grateful for the wholehearted support from the parents of our pupils. This high level of support contributes greatly to the work being done by the staff and to the success of pupils. We would encourage all parents to contact the school if they have any concerns about their child’s work or wellbeing and to attend the annual Parents’ meetings held for each Year group. During 2020-21 we have had an increased focus on pupil well-being and support due to Covid19. This has included additional counselling support, well-being activities and pupil treats.

SCHOOL DISCIPLINE POLICY:

Parkhall Integrated College has a positive behaviour policy, with guidance provided for implementation on a daily basis by staff. This document relates to issues such as conduct, courtesy, anti-bullying and classroom behaviour. A copy of the policy is available for parents on request. Every opportunity is taken to apply positive reinforcement through our rewards system and by encouraging pupils to engage fully in the wider life of the school. The School extends its sanctions policy to cover the actions of pupils who are wearing school uniform, travelling to and from school and those attending school visits or trips. Any pupil found to be bringing the name of the school into disrepute may be subject to the school disciplinary procedures. SCHOOL UNIFORM

School Uniform is seen by the Governors as being very important in contributing to the ethos of the school and to a sense of identity among its pupils. The creation of a revamped school uniform has seen many of our pupils wear their school uniform with pride.
We would encourage parents to support this policy and try to ensure that pupils do not attempt to persuade parents that deviations from uniform

requirements are acceptable e.g. wearing training shoes. Full uniform requirements are available in the school prospectus or from the school office.

During 2020- 21 we have continued to be more flexible with the day to day management of school uniform due to Covid19. Pupils have been permitted to wear their PE Kit to school on PE/Games days and ¼ zips have been permitted to be worn with school uniform. In periods of colder weather pupils have been encouraged to wear additional layers of clothing within the school building.

Key Stage 4 Curriculum

At Key Stage 4 pupils make subject choices appropriate to their needs, abilities and interests. Decisions are made after consultation with Careers teachers, subject teachers and parents.

Links have been established with the Northern Regional College enabling some pupils to follow vocational courses, externally validated through the CCEA Occupational Studies Award. Pupils can choose from Hair and Beauty, Catering, Vehicle Studies and Construction (Brickwork and Joinery). In collaboration with the NRC and other schools in our Learning Community, pupils are able to enrol in Horticulture and Horse Care vocational courses, externally validated through Edexcel BTEC qualifications.

Our curriculum is enhanced through enrichment initiatives and an array of extra-curricular activities. The curriculum is regularly reviewed to meet changing needs and statutory demands.

Examinations

All pupils are encouraged to sit external examinations which cater for the full ability range. For the Summer 2021 Examinations series the school provided a Centre-determined Grades Policy through CCEA in order to supply the Examination Boards with the required information for each candidate. The work of the staff in producing this information is to be commended.

3. SUMMARY OF SCHOOL/COMMUNITY LINKS

Embodied in the School Aims is a commitment to close links between school, parents, the local and wider community. The school is conscious that learning experiences abound for pupils outside the confines of the classroom. In consequence, the curriculum is enhanced through an array of educational visits, field trips and community support programmes which are provided for pupils each year.

In addition, the governors are most appreciative of the support provided by the community for our school in terms of assisting within the classroom and accepting our pupils in their premises. The youth club runs five nights each week and boasts perhaps the largest number of members of any EA Youth Club. A large number of activities are available to the members and discussion groups are also part of the programme. The state of the art Youth facilities within the new building are appreciated by all.

Other activities available to members include outdoor pursuits, senior member training, social weekends, residentials, visits to other clubs and an opportunity to become involved in a range of projects which highlight the issues most important to young people today. Members are also encouraged to involve themselves as far as possible in the running of the club.

Unfortunately due to Covid19 this programme greatly restricted for a long period of time and when re-introduced, was managed within the Youth Service Restart Programme.

In the evenings both sites are extensively used by community groups and external agencies including Camera Club, Antrim Choral Society, Parkhall Bowling Club, Angling Club, NIGFAS, Fibromyalgia Group and Macmillan Cancer Support, amongst others. During 2020- 21 this usage has been almost entirely reduced due to Covid 19.

Through participation in the 'Extended Schools' programme and through the voluntary efforts of staff our pupils have the opportunity to participate in Breakfast Club, Science Club, ICT Club, Fitness Training, Film Club, and Art Club, although 2020-21 many of these activities were unable to run due to Covid 19.

The NRC adult education provision continues to be hosted in the evenings including GCSE English and GCSE Maths, English for speakers of other languages and essential skills in literacy and Numeracy. This provision was unable to run during this year due to Covid 19.

Parkhall Integrated College forms part of the Antrim Learning Community which considers access to an enhanced range of subject choices at 14+ and opportunities for staff and/or pupils to work collaboratively allowing us to forge closer links with Antrim Grammar School, Crumlin Integrated School, St Benedict's College, Rathmore Guidance Centre and Riverside Special School.

The College also enjoys excellent working relationships with our Shared Education partners at Antrim Grammar and St Benedicts which helps us to provide a wide range of joint curricular, community and sport-based activities and experiences which continue to develop respect for others, tolerance and mutual understanding amongst pupils. In addition the College plays an important role in the Antrim and Randalstown Schools Moving Forward Together Project in conjunction with a range of Nursery schools, primary schools and post primary schools within the Borough. Unfortunately due to Covid 19 many of these activities were unable to run, especially the pupil facing programmes. Some staff training did take place, the majority of which was conducted on-line and remotely.

9. CAREERS

Careers Education is an essential element in our curriculum and all pupils have a designated Careers period within their timetable; Years 8-10 for Employability, Years 11 and 12 for Careers. Trips out of school and visiting speakers are regularly organised to enhance the work of the Careers Department.

Pupils have opportunities to develop their self-awareness and recognise the skills and personal qualities required by employers. Year 11 pupils participate in a period of work experience designed to help them experience at first hand the challenges, demands and rewards of employment. Pupils taking Occupational Studies spend one day a week in a work placement in year 12.

A careers officer from the Training and Employment Agency is assigned to the school to support the work of the Careers staff and the school is fortunate to be supported by strong Business / Education links from within the area who take part in many of our Careers events and offer placement opportunities for our pupils. During 2020-21 most of this provision took place remotely on on-line.

Our pupils benefit from this support by making successful transitions to employment, or to Further and Higher Education. Pupils in Years 13 and 14 take part in Enrichment to develop a range of skills to make them more rounded, employable individuals. Skills such as leadership, communication, resilience are promoted, to make our pupils more successful in their individual pathways. During 2020-21 opportunities for Work Experience were limited to on-line/remote experiences.

Links with universities on the mainland, Queen's University, Ulster University, Northern Regional College and Belfast Met, as well as industry ensures that all of our pupils choose the option that is appropriate for them in their future life to be successful and progress.

10. SPORTING OPPORTUNITIES PROVIDED FOR PUPILS

The Physical Education Department aims to provide pupils with a learning environment which enables them to:



11. SCHOOL SECURITY

It is vital that everyone feels safe and secure on our school premises and to this end, we operate a comprehensive security system. Entry to the school car park is via electronically controlled barriers. Once any visitor/parent/maintenance person has entered the school grounds, he or she must report to Reception at the front of the school to be issued with a visitor's lanyard and to be signed in. external doors throughout the school are controlled by magnetic locks. CCTV operates around the outside of the school building and also within internal circulation areas.
