I am delighted to endorse this latest edition of our long-standing annual summary of school life here in Parkhall Integrated College.

This school year began with a lot more optimism following a decrease in the impact of Covid-19 in the community, and many were looking forward to a more normal school year, albeit with bubbles and many of the restrictions still in place. This year, we welcomed 178 pupils into year 8 and 69 pupils into year 13, giving an overall school population of 1006 pupils.

After Christmas, however, a new strain of the virus led to a further long period of disruption to learning with many staff and pupils being absent from school during this time.

Pupils undertaking GCSE and A-level courses have been able to sit public examinations in person for the first time since 2019, and our best wishes go to all of these pupils. Slowly we have seen a return towards normality in school with the year 14 formal, the year 12 and 14 leavers' events and a range of other sports activities and visits re-commencing.

This year is a very significant year for the school as we celebrate the 50th anniversary of the opening and the first school year in 1971-72. In what has been a very turbulent time for education in Antrim with a range of school closures, it is a significant achievement that Parkhall remains as the provider for all-ability pupils within the town. I would like to take this opportunity to recognise the tremendous efforts of both past and previous governors, principals, teaching staff, pupils and parents who have all contributed to providing fifty years of education for the community within Antrim and beyond.

On a personal note, having decided to retire from my role as principal at the end of this year, I would like to say a huge thank-you to all within the Parkhall Integrated College community who have supported me during my fourteen years in this role. I have immensely enjoyed the opportunity to consolidate the integrated status, move from the split site into a new state-of-the-art facility, introduce post-16 education and see the growth of the school, both in terms of numbers and in terms of educational achievement and extra-curricular opportunities. Watching pupils arrive as young eleven-year-olds and leave as mature eighteen-year-olds ready to enter university, further education or employment remains my greatest pleasure.

I wish everyone in the school community every success in the future!

The anti-bullying week's theme was co-designed with young people before being adopted by the UK's leading anti-bullying organisations including **respectme**.




### Senior Prefects 2021/22


### Christmas Hampers



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

### Competitive Football Comes Home for the Boys at Parkhall Integrated College


After a long break from competitive action, the boys at Parkhall Integrated College were raring to go on the brand-new grass football pitches in October.

During the three weeks of initial trials, we were put through various skills challenges and fitness tests. Fortunately, I was selected and then went on to several weeks of Ulster training in preparation for the interprovincial games. Having trained three times a week, the team was beginning to come together, and the girls whom I had been playing against for most of the season from other clubs were now my friends and teammates.

The first game was supposed to be against Munster, but Covid19 had caused the match to be drawn, and it was postponed to a later date as a friendly and not as an Interpro match. Therefore, our first game was against Leinster at St Mary's College RFC in Dublin. Unfortunately, we were beaten by the better team on this occasion, but for most of the girls, including myself, this was our first 15-a-side match. As a team, we had learnt so much from this game. The coaches then worked on the skills we needed to improve for the next match against Connaught. During this game, I made some big tackles, carried and scrummaged well. I was also good in the lineouts.

The second game was against Connaught at MU Barnhall in Dublin. The hard work, determination and effort put in during training paid off, with a thrilling 12-5 win. My fellow club teammate and friend scored a try after I stole a ball at the lineout. It was a brilliant performance by the team, and again I made big tackles, carried well and won lineouts. As a team, we scrummaged and were dominant in the rucks. The win lifted the team's spirits for the end of the Interpro series. Ulster U18 came second in the series. The coaches did an absolutely amazing job, getting us to this point.

The third game was a friendly but was still contested fiercely against Munster. The hard work and effort put in paid off once again with a 19-15 win. At half time, it was 10-0 to Munster, but we came back strongly in the second half. The girls showed so much passion and determination, and we definitely displayed the skills and fitness that had been taught through the second half. I scored a try by showing a dummy and ran a good length of the pitch.

At the end of the season, we were asked to attend the Nevin Spence Theatre at the Kingspan Stadium to receive our playing shirts. This was a great night, and we were even given free tickets to watch Ulster play Northampton in the European Cup. It was a great night all round as Ulster won 27-22.





# Jorja Battshill Ireland's U-18 Women's 6 Nations

Having been selected to represent Ulster in the interprovincial series last year, I was then selected to attend trials for Ireland at the High-Performance Sports Centre in Dublin over three successive weekends in March, staying over at the Carlton Hotel each weekend. The initial cohort of players on trial included six individuals from Ulster. The other thirty came from across Ireland. The thirty-six individuals would be cut to twenty-six on the last weekend, which made things very tense.

Since I had only recently passed my driving test, the drive down for the first weekend's training was quite daunting but at the same time quite fulfilling. The training itself was complicated, physical and more demanding than anything I had previously experienced. Training twice a day both days was very tiring. However, there was a lot of down time for socialising and recovery. Sarah Delaney, who plays for Leinster, was my roommate for the first two weekends. As fellow forwards, we got on really well. On reflection, after the first weekend, I was unsure if I would make the cut due to my performance not meeting my usual high expectations. Perhaps nerves were at play.

The second weekend went well. Pops, the coach, reinforced that I was most definitely capable and able to operate at this level and helped me with my confidence. During that weekend, we got to see the full Ireland ladies' team play against Wales. It was a good game, but we lost 17-27. We also played our own training match where I scored a try, which helped my confidence and gave me belief in my ability. I also got a black eye, which looked pretty cool, I thought...

The third weekend consisted mainly of training, selection and kit issue, so it was a nervous weekend for all. Thankfully, I made it, along with three others from Ulster, and was selected to play for Ireland in the Under-18 Six Nations in Edinburgh. I was so delighted that I phoned my parents as soon as I could. They were so proud. The U18 Six Nations commenced mid-week with a flight from Dublin to Edinburgh on Thursday 7th April. The team met at the airport, all wearing their newly issued rugby kit. It was quite a moment to behold. The flight out was bumpy and uncomfortable, but we landed safely and were ferried to our accommodation for the next seven days at the Holiday Inn near Edinburgh Zoo.



The first two games were scheduled for Saturday, so the focus of activity over the first few days was drills, pitch sessions and recovery sessions, all in preparation for game day. It gave me a good understanding of the life of a professional sportsperson. The first game against England was a very closely fought match. Our structured play was very effective, and our defence was good. It's a game we should have won, but unfortunately, England scored in the last few minutes, with the final score 17-12. The second game that day was against France. They were a very powerful and well-rehearsed team who unfortunately put us to the sword; we lost 26-0. My nan, grandad and brother were there to watch and most definitely made themselves heard.

The final game against Wales was to be played in the DAM Health Stadium in the shadow of Murrayfield. The game was highly contested. Our forwards dominated, but their backs were the difference. I played very well and won thirteen out of thirteen lineouts. I also dummied their players in our own 22 and made significant yardage. My defence was good, and my scrummaging was excellent, but unfortunately, the final result was 17-10 to Wales. My mum and dad were there for this match. They too made themselves heard. This match was also televised, which was great. I got to watch the game back multiple times to my parents' annoyance – analysis, analysis!

In all, I was very proud to play for my country. I enjoyed the experience immensely and sincerely hope that more young girls take up the sport. The future for me, I hope, is to continue my rugby journey, get stronger and fitter, improve my athletic performance and maybe even play for Ireland's women's full team. Who knows what the future will bring? Provided that my A-level results go to plan, I will be going to Hartpury University in Gloucestershire, where I hope to be playing lots of rugby and maybe even in the Premiership with Gloucester women's rugby team.

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



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# Parkhall Integrated College Celebrates FIFTY YEARS

This year marks the fiftieth anniversary of the town's longest-standing post-primary school, and the college would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thankyou to all the current and former pupils and staff who have played a role in that journey.

As a school, we would like to mark this occasion by taking a trip down memory lane with a series of photos from the 1970s through to the present day.

We remember the school opening in September 1971 with an initial enrolment of 320 pupils in first, second and third years only, growing year on year after that. Some may remember the first-ever principal, Mr John Graham, assisted by vice-principal Mr Morris Jackson and 'Senior Mistress' Mrs Roberta Hughes.

When Parkhall opened, there was only one other post-primary school: Antrim Secondary. By the end of the decade, this had risen to five with the addition of Antrim

The inaugural head boy and head girl, first appointed in 1973, were Barry Paine and Shirley Forsythe. How many of us could remember the names of the staff captured in the adjoining photograph?
