Thank you for your interest in Parkhall Integrated College. I trust you will find our prospectus helpful as an introduction to life in our school. As a caring learning institution we aim to serve our local community through providing an inclusive, child-centred environment in which all students achieve their full potential.



The curriculum is designed to provide an opportunity for all pupils to succeed, whether their strengths are vocational, academic or a combination of both. Pupils with additional needs are well catered for and supported and partake fully in every aspect of school life. The addition of post-16 education allows our pupils to complete their education from year 8 through to year 14, following a range of vocational and academic courses designed to allow the pupils to move into further education, higher education or employment, and we were delighted with both the results and the pathways followed by our first cohort of pupils in August including pupils attending Napier University, Liverpool John Moores University, Cumbria University, Edgehill Union University and Central Lancashire University and a range of courses at Ulster University.

Our college is rightly proud of its long-standing reputation of academic achievement and extra-curricular opportunities, and we regard the education of our pupils as a partnership between the young people, their parents, the school and the local community.

We are absolutely delighted to be located in our state-of-the-art school building from January 2018. This £20-million-pound investment has brought all of our pupils and staff together on one site, and our current enrolment figure has risen to almost 880 pupils. Each classroom is equipped with new technology, including interactive panels, which enhances the teaching and learning opportunities for our pupils, and our sporting provision has been enhanced by our AstroTurf facility, five tennis courts, two indoor sports halls and a fitness suite. Our grass sporting facilities will be in use in January 2020.

Each year the school attracts pupils from a diverse range of feeder primary schools and from all religious and ethnic backgrounds and traditions. Building upon the college's integrated ethos, we are striving forward with continued efforts aimed at addressing the religious balance within the school and welcome children from all faiths and none. This year, the college admitted 199 year 8 pupils from twenty-seven different primary schools.

The GCSE examination results have improved steadily over the past five years, with a five-year average for five A* - C grades currently at 83%. The five-year average for five A*-E grades is 94%, and the seven A*-C three-year average is 52%, all of which are on or above the Northern Ireland average for similar schools. Annually, a significant number of pupils obtain eight, nine, ten or eleven A*-C GCSE grades.

I hope that you feel very welcome as you visit our school and can sense the strong relationships that permeate the school community.

Our College

Mission Statement:

Parkhall Integrated College is a well-established and successful school for 11 to 19-year-olds with a current enrolment of 880 pupils.

Our school ethos is based on Christian values and standards. We value each person in our school community regardless of colour, religion, creed or cultural background and believe that all can benefit from, and make a positive contribution to the life of our school.

There are currently pupils from eleven different religious denominations attending the school, including the two main traditions here in Northern Ireland, and pupils with twelve different home languages other than English. These languages include those listed and Slovak, Lithuanian, Polish, Portuguese, Flemish, Chinese, Slovenian, Hungarian, Latvian, Urdu, Romanian, Spanish, Thai, Kannada and others.

Every year the school welcomes new pupils from a large number of feeder primary schools. The current year-8 intake draws from twenty seven different primary schools in the greater Antrim area.

Positive Behaviour

Effective learning and teaching can only take place when attitudes and behaviour are positive.

Our behaviour policy is based on the simple requirements of courtesy and mutual respect, which contribute to the development and maintenance of good behaviour and a positive ethos. The code of conduct is on display in all classrooms and is reinforced by teachers in class and through assemblies.

Pupils are encouraged to develop a sense of responsibility through opportunities to become a class monitor, mentor, member of the school council, junior prefect or senior prefect.



Rewards

Rewards are very important and carry considerable weight in Parkhall Integrated College. In this way pupils will achieve recognition for a positive contribution to school life.

Such contributions include quality classwork, effort, good behaviour, high levels of attendance and adherence to the code of conduct. Rewards can be informal through teacher praise and display of good work, and more formal in the shape of merit stickers, pens, certificates, vouchers, attendance tokens, presentations in assembly and special trips.

In Parkhall Integrated College, we strive to raise self-esteem and self-confidence through recognising and rewarding our young people's achievements. This initiative was highlighted as an example of good practice within the ETI Inspection Report, citing the "tangible support from local businesses".

Induction

In Parkhall Integrated College, we have always been sensitive to this stage in our pupils' lives and put a great deal of thought into the planning and carrying out of the induction period.

In June, we have an induction evening for the year 7 pupils and parents. During this evening, the pupils receive an induction pack which gives information about the school uniform and the structure of the school. Pupils and parents are introduced to the principal, senior staff and heads of year 8.

At the start of the school year, we have an induction programme for year 8. The pupils meet their class teacher and the other members of their class, take part in activities which focus on the integrated ethos of the college, and get to know their way around the school building.

During their first term at the college, year 8 pupils are involved in presentations and workshops on child protection, attendance, study skills and a session entitled "Stand up to Bullying".



Individual Pupil Support

Some pupils may require a greater focus on the core skills, and the timetable organisation allows for this.

We feel that it is vital that each pupil is given the opportunity to fulfil his or her potential and develop the skills needed to become a valuable member of the school community. To achieve this we review the needs of pupils and implement a range of strategies to ensure that all pupils reach their potential.

Those pupils who need support in their learning are provided with opportunities for individual and group tuition from staff with specialist skills and commitment. Close contact with parents is maintained, and learning support assistants give help and guidance in class. In addition, many pupils benefit from numeracy and literacy withdrawal support, in accordance with Education Authority recommendations.

Pupils who need to be supported academically benefit from smaller class sizes. We use Individual Education Plans (IEPs) and Individual Behaviour Plans (IBPs) for pupils with specific needs. Our lunchtime club for pupils with ASD and vulnerable pupils has proved particularly popular as it provides a moment of calm in the busy school day. To this end, our Aspire Club for girls with ASD has been hugely successful.

All staff are regularly informed regarding pupil needs, including staff training and meetings. To support pupils who have a diagnosis of ASD, we have an autism support teacher in school. This allows pupils to benefit from individual support and access to our school sensory room. Pupils are further supported through the use of access arrangements for internal and external exams.

The Education Authority Literacy Service, along with Educational Psychology are utilised where their support is considered beneficial. Other individual support is obtained from the Education Authority Behaviour Support Service based at Rathmore Education and Guidance Centre. The Autism Advisory and Intervention Service (AAIS) support individual pupils and have provided whole staff training. This year our year 13 and 14 pupils have been volunteering to provide additional reading support through our Book Buddies scheme for year 8 pupils.

Pastoral Care

The most recent ETI Inspection graded the pastoral care provision in the college as “very good”.

In Parkhall Integrated College, we believe that children learn best in an environment where they feel happy, secure and valued. We therefore place great emphasis on our pastoral care programme, which fosters positive relationships and community spirit. We strive to ensure every child has opportunities to achieve success, not only in academic or vocational study, but also in the wider life of our school.

We promote healthy lifestyles and positive attitudes in all of our pupils as well as fostering an environment where diversity is valued and where the worth and self-esteem of all individuals within the school are paramount.

Counselling

Parkhall Integrated College has a pastoral team to help support our pupils.

They are available along with year heads to talk to individual pupils who may need help and support in overcoming whatever difficulties they are facing.

Pastoral staff work closely with parents to help pupils with any academic, emotional or behavioural concerns, and a wide range of outside agencies are also accessed when deemed necessary.

The EA has provided a counsellor for all schools in the board area. Pupils can self-refer to the college’s counsellor or referrals can be made by pastoral staff.

Courses in Business Studies, Music, Drama, Learning for Life and Work, and Careers are also offered to key stage 3 pupils.

In year 8, pupils are differentiated into bands based on GL assessment in consultation with the heads of year. The allocation of pupils to particular classes takes place at the end of each school year, and there are opportunities for individual pupils to transfer between classes based on the tracking of their academic progress, which is measured on four separate occasions each year.



Curriculum

The key stage 3 and key stage 4 curricula are organised into subject areas to comply with the areas of study identified in the Northern Ireland Education Reform Order. All pupils study Religious Studies, Learning for Life and Work and Careers Education.

All curriculum development is guided by the school's aims and mission statement. Finance, personnel and other resources are determined by the college's curriculum. Decision-making for curriculum development is led by the principal and vice-principals, channelled through curriculum-related staff and heads of departments.



Key Stage 4

All pupils follow the Northern Ireland Curriculum.

The college complies with the Entitlement Framework and offers 32 courses, both general and applied. All pupils at key stage 4 have the opportunity to study a broad and balanced curriculum. This enables the college to provide an individualised learning programme, leading to each pupil having opportunities to fulfil his or her academic potential.

The college is a member of Antrim Learning Community, which enables our pupils to access a wider range of courses. Collaborative courses at key stage 4 are offered in conjunction with Northern Regional College (NRC).

All key stage 4 pupils are entered for public examinations in English, Mathematics and Science. The majority study between five and seven subjects to GCSE or equivalent, and a number of pupils have the opportunity to study a further two courses. The school will continue to monitor and evaluate the success of the courses offered so that all pupils experience a curriculum which suits their abilities, aptitudes and career ambitions.

At key stage 4, pupils are organised into broad ability bands on the basis of year 10 examination performance, key stage 3 assessments and progress during year 10. Particular attention is paid to pupil performance in the core subjects of English, Mathematics and Science.

Key Stage 5

Our pupils will now have the opportunity to remain at Parkhall Integrated College to undertake post-16 education in a range of subject areas that lead on from GCSE qualifications.

We have always believed that our pupils should have the opportunity to continue in a learning environment in which they feel supported, secure and happy.

At post-16 level, our pupils have the opportunity to follow a pathway in the following areas: Art and Design, Business Studies, Health and Social Care (single and double award), ICT, Life and Health Sciences (single and double award), Maths, Sport, Sports Coaching and Travel and Tourism. In addition, students may also select from a number of courses on offer in a collaborative block with Antrim Grammar School. Pupils engage in a Careers programme that will allow them to consider studying at university or further education or to consider employment in their chosen area.

Enrichment opportunities include: sports activities, Young Enterprise, volunteering and mentoring and Spanish amongst others.

Examinations

All pupils are encouraged to sit external examinations which cater for the full ability range in a wide range of courses suited to the individual pupil.

Most departments consistently achieve above the NI average for non-selective schools. In terms of GCSE performance, the percentage of pupils gaining at least five A*-C grades has increased steadily over the past few years, with a three-year average of 81%. Of particular note are those pupils who have gained up to and including twelve A*-C grades at GCSE level. There has also been a 10% increase in the number of pupils achieving five A*-C grades including English and Mathematics in the past three years.

At post-16, pupils can complete BTEC, Cambridge Nationals, CCEA and City and Guilds courses. Last year, 51% of Parkhall Integrated College pupils achieved three A*-C grades at key stage 5 level, while 95% achieved three A*-E grades.

Following the examinations, our pupils followed a variety of progression routes including Ulster University, Central Lancashire, Napier University, Edgehill, Cumbria University, Liverpool John Moores, NRC, Belfast Met, soccer scholarships and SU internships.



Careers

Careers Education is an essential element in our curriculum.

All pupils from year 8 through to year 14 have Careers classes. Trips out of school and visiting speakers are regularly organised to enhance the work of the Careers department.

Pupils have opportunities to develop their self-awareness and recognise the skills and personal qualities required by employers. Year 14 pupils are guided through the daunting UCAS process to gain a place at the university of their choice. Year 11 and year 13 pupils participate in a period of work experience designed to help them experience at first hand the challenges, demands and rewards of employment. Pupils taking Occupational Studies at the NRC in year 12 spend one day a week in a work placement, putting their new-found skills into practice.

Staff from the Careers Service of the Department of the Economy are in regular contact with senior pupils to offer impartial careers advice on future progression routes.



Pupil Leadership Opportunities

An important element of school life is the need to provide opportunities for our young people to display their leadership skills through a variety of roles.

The senior prefects are led ably by a senior team consisting of the head boy and head girl and a number of deputies. Committees are formed to contribute to charity work, school events and the organisation of the school formal.

In junior school, we annually have an excellent team of junior prefects who assist with the day-to-day running of the school and a team of mentors who help our year-eight children to settle, by visiting form classes and assisting with any issues. The school council is elected each year and plays an active role in school life, contributing to school evaluation and improvement.

These leadership positions give our young people the opportunity to display their many talents and abilities.



Primary School Links

The college enjoys close links with a large number of primary schools throughout the Antrim area.

Pupils from many of our feeder primary schools have frequently participated in projects and workshops in a wide variety of subjects within the college.

This year, pupils from Antrim, Ballycraigy, Crumlin Integrated, Greystone, Loanends, Parkgate, Parkhall, Six Mile Integrated and Templepatrick Primary Schools participated in an activity day to sample life in the 'big-school' environment. All of the pupils and staff had a thoroughly enjoyable experience.

Parkhall Integrated College is proud of its relationships with the local feeder primary schools, built up over a number of years. We have had a variety of opportunities for the primary schoolchildren to benefit from the wonderful facilities in the new campus and are always actively seeking new ways in which to expand this ever-growing relationship.



Charities

The caring ethos of our school is clearly demonstrated by the positive response made by our pupils during our charity appeals.

Even though there are many demands on their resources, pupils regularly contribute to a variety of relevant charities.

We regularly welcome representatives to assembly to raise awareness and develop a deeper understanding of the charities we support. Although we actively encourage pupils to participate in high-profile events, we equally welcome the weekly contributions made by both pupils and teachers.

In the past, contributions have been made to Barnardo's, NSPCC, MS, Macmillan Cancer, Selection Box Saturday and the Christmas Shoebox Appeal, among others. This year the whole school community made a tremendous effort in raising a substantial amount of money for the Cash for Kids NI province-wide fundraising initiative.



Parent Voice

For many years, the college has had a very supportive Parent Voice group who contribute greatly to school functions and events in the college.

All parents are welcome to become part of this group, which has had the opportunity to ensure that the voice of parents is heard regarding major issues within the college.

In the past year, issues discussed have included school policies, for example, an anti-bullying policy and the use of a parent app. This group provides representation for parents and can be a forum for parent issues or concerns to be raised. This increased participation should hopefully deepen parental awareness and understanding of the ethos of the college.





Home-School Partnership

As partners in the education process, we expect parents to support the school actively in maintaining the caring discipline and high standards of learning we all wish to achieve.

One of the most important elements of a successful education is regular attendance at school. We work closely with the Educational Welfare Service and parents to ensure high standards of attendance and punctuality. Year heads make regular contact with parents where attendance is an issue.

Individual pupils with 100% attendance are recognised on a monthly basis through certificates and awards. Registration class attendance in each year group is recognised monthly through class attendance shields and annually through reward trips.

We value highly the close links that develop between parents and teachers and encourage and welcome on-going contact.

We believe that when pupils, parents and school support each other, positive relationships develop and reach their full potential.

Tracking reports, highlighting effort, attainment levels and behaviour are sent to parents. Parent consultation sessions are held throughout the year to provide opportunities for parents to talk to individual teachers and in meetings with their year heads, discuss their child's progress.

A special information evening for year-8 parents before the children join us has proved to be helpful in making the induction process as easy as possible.

We expect parents to support the school in implementing our behaviour policy, which is issued to each parent annually.

Shared Education

At Parkhall Integrated College we firmly believe that developing respect for others is a key attribute of all our pupils. To encourage this, pupils are regularly given the opportunity to engage in a range of workshops, events and programmes.

Over the past few years, pupils have participated in IEF PACT programmes, the Dissolving Boundaries programme, the Games of 3 Halves initiative with IFA, GAA and IRFU, the Flags of Hope programme and the Amazing the Space project.

In addition, the college is currently engaged in the Shared Education Programme alongside Antrim Grammar School

and St. Benedict's College. The partnership involves pupil activities with years 8, 9 and 10 through LLW, shared school council events and visits and opportunities for staff development and sharing of expertise.

The college has also made a significant contribution to the development of the Moving Forward Together (MFT) group consisting of nineteen schools across all sectors from

nursery to post-primary ages. The focus of the groups is to develop a common approach to cross-community and good relations work across all schools in the Antrim and Randalstown area. This has developed into a dynamic vehicle for sharing expertise and pupil events, alongside extensive networking opportunities.



Youth Club

The youth club runs five nights a week and boasts a high membership of both pupils and non-pupils of Parkhall.

A large number of activities are available to the members, including all sporting activities: football (for both girls and boys), basketball, Unihoc etc. We also have use of the floodlit outdoor pitches. Art and crafts play a large role on junior nights, where young people are encouraged to use their imagination to its fullest. We have three pool tables, a table-football table, a table-tennis table and a number of computer consoles. We also have a large fully fitted kitchen for cooking projects.

Other activities available to members include outdoor pursuits, senior member training, residential visits and visits to other clubs and an opportunity for our members to become involved in a range of projects which highlight the issues most important to them today.

A very successful summer scheme currently runs for two weeks in July for children in the surrounding communities.



Community Involvement

The college enjoys excellent links with the local community on many levels:

For many years the college has hosted a wide range of community groups including the Camera Club, Parkhall Bowling Club, Art Club, Antrim Choral Society, Angling Antrim Macmillan Fundraising Committee and the Northern Ireland Flower Arranging Society amongst others. These groups have been housed in both the junior and senior schools in the past and are now enjoying the new school facilities.

The indoor sporting facilities including the sports hall, with its cricket practice nets, and the fitness suite continue to be very popular with a range of local sports clubs and this has been supplemented by the floodlit AstroTurf pitch, which is currently being used by hockey and football teams.

Following the closure of the local NRC campus, the adult education community provision has been hosted in the college, offering courses in GCSE English and Maths, ICT courses, word-processing, ESOL courses and Essential Skills in English and Maths and counselling courses. In addition to these courses, the Extended Schools Programme has also allowed courses in cooking, fitness-training, salsa dancing and ICT to take place.

The college also enjoys good relationships with a range of local businesses through the rewards programme and the work experience programme.

Extra-curricular Activities

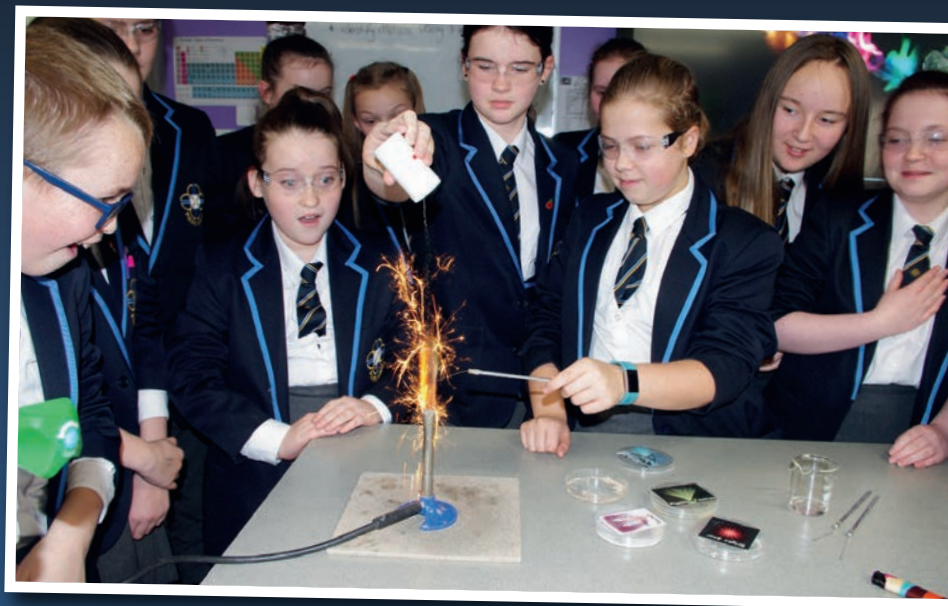
Many aspects of school life such as residentials, clubs, societies and youth club membership contribute further to our pupils' personal growth. Participation in the above assists in the overall development of our young people.
