























Saphara - Be the Change

We were delighted to welcome Saphara's education director, Paula Stronge, into the post-16 assembly to present the Be the Change Awards to members of last year's Be the Change team. Rachel Foster, Eve Kirkpatrick and Ellie Wilding received their award after their yearlong commitment to the programme.

Saphara is a Northern Ireland-based charity passionate about the power of education to change the world. They work in partnership with schools in India and alongside newcomer children in Northern Ireland to provide education to some of the most marginalised children. Last year, our Parkhall Integrated College team raised an exceptional amount of money, allowing Saphara to provide education for fourteen children in its partner schools in India. Now, we are ready to do it all over again.



Paula also launched the award to our current year 13s, who could become part of this worthwhile project. The award is set to inspire and equip our students to be local and global citizens, bringing students from different communities and backgrounds together to empower them to Be the Change they want to see in the world. Students involved will explore local and global issues of poverty, social justice and equality; fundraise to provide access to life-changing education for children living in some of India's poorest and most marginalised areas; and engage with newcomer children from across the world living here in Northern Ireland.

On Monday, 27th January, the Saphara: Be the Change team travelled to St Malachy's in Belfast for their second workshop. The students worked in groups, discussing what they considered a good life and exploring how this can look very different for the young people in India with whom Saphara works. Home was also explored, and the students began to understand why people may flee their homes, even if that means putting themselves and their loved ones in further danger.

Our Year 13 Saphara Be the Change team attended the first of three group workshops at Dominican College. Parkhall Integrated College was paired with Dominican College, St. Malachy's and Ashfield Boys in Belfast this year. Our team developed various skills and qualities throughout the year to help them become leaders who can change the world. They learnt some new and interesting facts about the partner schools of Saphara in India and newcomer children at home in Northern Ireland. SUPPORTING YOUR CHILD THROUGH THEIR GCSES

GCSE examinations can be a worrying prospect for your child and they will be under a great deal of pressure with deadlines and preparation. Here's how you can help.

POSITIVE START TO THE DAY

Encourage your child to pack their school bag and lay out their uniform before going to bed each evening.

Try to make sure your child eats breakfast. This provides essential energy and will help him or her perform better at school.

ENSURE YOU ARE KEPT INFORMED

Signing up to the schools Facebook, Twitter, text and email communications can ensure you have a better understanding of what's actually going on in school and what teachers are communicating to both students and parents.

PROVIDING ALL-BOUND SUPPORT

The best way to support your child during this stressful time is to make home life as calm and pleasant as possible. Tru not to nag or make too many demands. Arguments are counter productive and will only add unnecessary stress. Make sure there are plenty of healthy sunacks in the fridge and try to provide good, nutritious food at regular intervals. Encourage your child to join family meals, even if it is a busy revision day.

—it's important to have a change of scene and get away from the books and computer for a while. Also encourage your child to take regular exercise to help clear the mind.

HOMEWORK

Homework can often feel like a chore, and there are a million things your child would rather be doing! However, in years 10 and 11 your child should aim to do form 90 to 150 minutes of homework per day. Though this work is done independently, your interest and input is still important and helps your child to do well. Ask your child if there's anything you can do to help with homework. If your child has several assignments due in on the same day, suggest they space the work out rather than leave it all until the night before.

REVISION

The secret to doing well in exams lies in planning. You can help your child to create a clear revision plan and method of studying that will make them feel in control of their work.

- Work out a revision timetable for each subject
- Condense notes onto postcards to act as revision prompts Buy new stationery, highlighters and pens to make revision more interesting
- Go through school notes with your child or listen while they revise a topic

THE DAY OF THE EXAM

It's important to get a good night's sleep before an exam, so discourage your child from staying up late to cram. Make sure he or she eats a good breakfast on the morning of the exam and get them there with piently of time. Reassure them that although you want them to do well no matter what happens you are very proud of them.


Robot Friends

Congratulations to Sammy, who emerged as the champion in the robot wars. We thank Chris from Max Coding, who helped facilitate the event.


















Christmas Selection Box Appeal


Aware NI

Mood Matters Young People is an evidencebased programme which introduces the Five Areas Approach based on cognitive behavioural concepts. Participants use practical examples to learn that by challenging and changing unhelpful thinking and behaviours they can make a positive difference to their lives.

Mood Matters Young People also features Take 5 for emotional well-being, which focuses on the five most evidence-based ways of looking after our mental health (connect, be active, take notice, keep learning, and give). Participants take part in group activities and discussions that highlight ways that they can build Take 5 into their lives just by making some simple changes.





Gambling Awareness Workshop

The sixth-form students were delighted to welcome Mark from GamCare to deliver a Gambling Awareness workshop in the sixth-form centre on Thursday, 20th February. Students learned about the facts of gambling and gaming while also building their critical thinking skills and digital resilience. 












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Visit to Belfast City Hall




Introduction to colour






Book Week NI

Well done to everyone who took part, and a special well done to Lillie-Anna for her exceptional puzzle-solving skills.





- Where and how to seek help for yourself and others






Axiom Maths Circle






Year 10 Science















































































Macmillan Coffee Morning
