- Having a positive relationship with the school. Teachers and parents want exactly the same thing and that is the best for your child.
 - Provide your child with a space where they can complete their homework. This can be difficult but if a pupil has a quiet space with the resources they need, this can reduce stress when it comes to homework or revision time.

Try to create a routine for your child in the afternoons/evenings. A set time for homework/revision where possible helps pupils to develop their time management skills.

Maintaining motivation at home.

Pupils will have discussed target grades with their teachers. Make yourself familiar with the target grades set for your child in each subject and focus your child towards these grades.

For older pupils, have a discussion about what they want to do after school? Do they want to complete sixth form? A career goal is an excellent motivator. If you feel a reward will benefit your child, perhaps use a measured reward as an incentive to do well.
